Why Join 4-H? New Projects, Skills and FUN!

A Kentucky 4-H Club is defined as a group consisting of a minimum of five youth with a minimum of three annually elected officers (president, vice-president, secretary) that are provided training materials. The club should have a minimum of six hours of educational activities and at least five meetings. There are many different types of 4-H clubs. Adults who completed the youth protection guidelines may helps with the meetings.

The most common is a "School Club." An in-school 4-H club takes place during regular school hours. For grades 4th and 5th, they are organized as a single classroom. The middle and high schools clubs are organized school-wide and meet on their designated "club" day.

Most club members participate in broad based 4-H educational programs, service projects and gain leadership experiences.

A community 4-H club has members and leaders from a defined geographic region like all of Green County. These clubs have a wide age range of members involved in a variety of projects and activities. Examples of community clubs are Cloverbud Club (youth 5-8yo), Horse,

Nature, Shooting Sports, Livestock, International and Science clubs.

Project clubs are like Community Clubs except the focus is much tighter. A major portion of club meetings is devoted to project





work and preparation for activities. Our Preteen Club at GCMS and the Teen Club at GCHS are considered project clubs as they focus on Leadership and meet on their school's club day. Project Clubs may teach specific skills like Computer Coding, Cooking Classes, Astronomy, etc. and operate for a shorter duration.

4-H Clubs serve as the hub of activity and generate enthusiasm, for participation in 4-H events outside the club structure. Club

meetings are important learning experiences. 4-Hers gain benefits like leadership skills by helping plan and carry out club programs. Youth gain valuable communication skills.

Members learn decision making, develop citizenship skills, try new ideas and methods, develop confi-

dence, gain a sense of group pride and form a cooperative attitude.

4-H Clubs are open to all youth in Green County. Most clubs are free or have a small membership fee like \$5 per year. Youth must re-enroll each year for the clubs of interest. The 4-H year is September through August.

Cloverbuds (5-8yo)

Cloverbud gives children 5-8 years old opportunities to participate in Kentucky's 4-H Youth Development program by offering a set of organized activities developmentally appropriate for these ages. Clubs may include community, project, classroom school enrichment, home school, before or after school.

The Cloverbud program has been an active part of the overall Youth Development program in Green County in the past. We are in need of an adult volunteer to help plan activities for this age group. The activities can be on almost any topic that is age appropriate. The 4-H office can provide resources and suggestions.


Educational activities help youth to develop life and developmental skills including decision making, critical thinking, socialization, eye-hand coordination and large muscle use. Cloverbud learning centers on activities. Themes and topics may include environment, personal skills development, plant and animal sciences, nutrition and arts and crafts.

From robotics to cooking, 4-H's many programs, clubs and activities have something to interest every young person. If youth have an interest, talent or hobby, chances are they can learn more about it or do something productive with it in 4-H. As they learn more and do more in a particular interest area, a young person may develop a passion for a particular activity, eventually leading to a career in that field. 4-H provides a safe environment for exploration before young people choose a college major or commit to a particular career.

Youth can explore many of their interests under a caring adult volunteer's guidance. The volunteers are often experts in the topics they teach and show many career possibilities.

4-H activities foster creativity and get youth thinking outside of the box. Just some of the county-level programs offered by the UK Cooperative Extension Service 4-H Youth Development are job shadowing, mentoring, career preparation, assistance with cover letters, resumes and interviewing skills. Their passions may one day turn into a career.



NIFA Photo Contest

The National Institute of Food and Agriculture is hosting a photo contest related to one of their research projects. Photos should represent one of these topics: crop diversity, perennial crops, integrated forage-livestock systems, and agricultural resilience.

They are seeking high-quality images to use in their outreach and science communications. The contest is open to everyone and has separate categories and awards for youth and adults. Edited photos are acceptable, but all photos must be the complete work of the person submitting.

Forestry Field Day

Not only do they provide us with clean air, but they also provide shade, control soil erosion, serve as a wildlife habitat and have an important economic impact in Kentucky, among many other things. 4-H wants young Kentuckians to know and to appreciate trees and the natural environment.

4-H is offering a forestry project day to learn about trees and create a leaf collection that can be submitted to the county fair. The event is FREE and will be August 30. Interested youth must register by August 28. Youth may ride the school bus to the 4-H office, but will need an adult to pick them up at 4:30pm.

Youth interested may attend a regional 4-H Forestry field day set for September 14 in Taylor County. During the field day, 4-H'ers will learn how to identify and measure trees and how to use a compass and measure distances by pacing.

Volunteers Needed To Offer 4-H Shooting Sports

There are a few projects that 4-H requires counties to have adults trained specifically in a program to offer activities for our youth. The most popular request is Shooting Sports. We cannot offer them without adult volunteers who will be trained and assist with the project. 4-H is flexible on the dates/times of the meetings, but we must have a minimum of six hours of education for the youth to compete in any 4-H sponsored event. 4-H will pay for the training and provide resources to help volunteers teach the activities.

Shooting Sports is available to youth ages 9-18 as of January 1 for the program year which is September 1-August 30. Youth must be in involved in their local program based on where they live or where they go to school. Disciplines have age groups and may have specific equipment requirements. Safety is the utmost priority for the program. To offer the program, we must have a certified coach in each discipline we offer **AND** a certified Coordinator, who doesn't actually teach any disciplines. We need at least two volunteers to offer the program in Green County and more if we offer multiple disciplines.

Shooting Sports Disciplines

- Trap
- Rifle includes .22 Target/Sport,
 .177 Air Target/Sport and BB rifles
- Pistol includes .22 and Air pistols
- Archery includes Bowhunter, Target Compound, Target Recurve, Compound Bare, and Bare Recurve/ Long Bow
- Black Powder includes rifle and pistol
 Each discipline we offer must have a trained, certified instructor in addition to one certified Coordinator.
